

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Greetings to you all.

I hope and pray you all had a wonderful summer. The main gist of this report is to inform all of you on what has transpired since my last report and possible future projects requiring our attention, and in one case, urgent attention.

First, I thank you for your patience and indulgence during this construction period of our new church parking lot. As I write this, foundation has been installed and curbing will take place 10/2&3. 2 days of paving after that, then striping. We've had numerous delays and debates with installer, and progress has stepped up now that we have some decent weather.

We now have a substantial hole in the pavement at our Stryker Ave entrance. This is a separate issue from the arch as we solved that problem last year. We are currently looking at our best options for repair of this section but unfortunately, early prognosis seems to indicate a costly project.

The other concern is the delamination, (if that's the correct term), of sidewall on south facing of Social Center cause by continuous water run out along the building. I made up a makeshift temporary downspout to divert water away from the building but this will surely freeze during the winter months, so it's important we come up with a more permanent solution.

Now that I have brightened all of your day with such jolly news, fall is a nice time of the year and I hope you all enjoy the changing of the leaves. I have 11 oaks in my yard that really get colorful for you all to enjoy. (PS-bring a rake)

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Do We Have A Reaction To The Gospel?

The Reading from the Holy Gospel according to St. Mark. (8:34-9:1)

My dear brothers and sisters, to preach is a joyous but also a grave endeavor. The gospel teaching of the Lord Jesus Christ is not something boring or mundane. It is something powerful and life giving. Since it is dynamic and spirit filled and powerful, we should have a reaction to the words of the gospel. Our reaction should be negative towards ourselves and positive towards the teaching of the Lord Jesus Christ. Why should it be negative towards ourselves? That seems like a strange thing to say. We live in a society that coddles every individual and emphasizes self-esteem as the focus of development. The problem is that this leads us to become prideful and self-sufficient, and if we are prideful and self-sufficient, we are under the delusion that we have no need for God in our lives. We fall under the impression that we have nothing to learn and certainly don't need to waste our time developing a relationship with the Lord Jesus Christ and His saints. We begin to have faith in ourselves and we trust our opinions as good or trustworthy or important. So this is why I tell you that you should have a negative

reaction to yourselves, which will lead you to repentance and to have a humble spirit that can learn at the feet of Our Lord Jesus Christ.

But today's society is a direct result of what I have just mentioned. It is a society that has been bred on self-esteem and pride. This has infected nearly every aspect of life. Actions and works that ought to cause shame, are a point of pride and society has even gone so far as to condone and celebrate those awful and shameful things. I will not speak of them because there are children present and they don't need to be exposed to and corrupted by such things.

But the opposite has also happened in our society, the greatest wisdom ever given to the world, the teaching of our Lord Jesus Christ has become taboo. We are ashamed of the words of the Lord Jesus Christ. We are afraid to stand up for our faith and our beliefs. So the world is upside down. What should bring us confidence and joy, instead brings us shame and we are silent in the midst of those who hate our God and our way of life. Yet we are not ashamed of the things of this world, it's corruption and false teachings and the ways that will lead to spiritual death. Our Lord Jesus says "For what does it profit a man, to gain the whole world and forfeit his soul? For what can a man give in return for his soul?"

I started by telling you that preaching is a joyous and yet a grave endeavor and this is precisely why: I will be judged on whether I have taught you and warned you. I am responsible. The task of preaching is also joyous and yet a grave endeavor because the gospel forces us to pick a side and to change our very way of life. It never allows one to remain static in life. Either they are living faithfully or faithlessly, although there is a spectrum of faithfulness. That is why I tell you that we should have a negative view of ourselves and a positive view of Christ and His words of life. So if you hear something that you do not like, understand that one of the goals of a homily or sermon is to bring the gospel to life and to activate it in your heart. But understand that it cannot be activated unless our heart and mind are pricked and we begin to realize that we have to change our way of life. So the sermon is never meant to pick on anyone. It is not meant to attack. It is meant to expose our darkness (yours and mine) to the light of Christian truth.

When we've been in the dark for a long time and someone shines a light at our face, we will squint and draw away from the light. We will have the perception that the light is awful and terrible and painful. Yet this is not really the case, but only our perception because we've been in the darkness for so long. We've grown accustomed to it and have not been regularly exposed to the light. That is how it is when we read and study the Scriptures and hear the gospels and the homilies that are based on the gospels. When we become accustomed to the word of God, we are changed and transformed by exposure to the light.

Today, we live fairly comfortable lives. We have what we need and then some. We are entertained and informed nearly 24 hours a day. On this note let me say that we need to be vigilant with our own senses and with our children and the media and screen time they consume. It not only affects their psychology and development, but it also creates an imprint on their souls. Balance and moderation are necessary. I know that you love your children, take the task seriously and do not trust the television or computer to do the job.

We live comfortable, wealthy lives. We have so much and yet according to our Lord Jesus Christ, if we don't have His teaching in our lives, we are really empty. More than this, we

are already dead. As Christians we are called to live radical lives and that will not look anything like the radicals you see on the news. The radical way of the Christian is the way of obedience to the teachings of Christ and the radical way of love. When we live this radical love, we will probably be attacked and misunderstood. But that is precisely our cross in this world. Listen to the words of the Lord "If any man would come after Me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow Me. For whoever would save his life will lose it; and whoever loses his life for My sake and the Gospel's will save it."

What are we willing to compromise in order to be comfortable or safe in this world? On the other hand, what are we willing to sacrifice in this world in order to be comfortable in the presence of God and His angels and saints? Because we can't escape that reality. One day, we have to meet God. We will be in His presence. What are you willing to deny yourself for the hope of knowing God more intimately? Will we deny ourselves some of the time we spend on social media or Netflix? Will we deny ourselves some of the time we spend socializing and playing games? Will we deny ourselves some of the time we spend working on our projects and taking on additional work? The time and attention we have are finite. What might happen to us if we dedicated some of these finite resources to the infinite God? Time and energy is given to you as great and precious gifts? How will you answer for these gifts and how you redeemed them?

In today's reading the Lord said, "If any man would come after Me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow Me." I want to leave you with a quote from St. Nicholai of Zicha, he writes, "What does it mean to take up your cross? It means the willing acceptance, at the hand of Providence, of every means of healing, that is offered, bitter though it may be. Do great catastrophies fall on you? Be obedient to God's will, as Noah was. Is sacrifice demanded of you? Give yourself into God's hands with the same faith as Abram had when he went to sacrifice his son. Is your property ruined? Do your children die suddenly? Suffer it all with patience, cleaving to God in your heart, as Job did. Do your friends forsake you, and you find yourself surrounded by enemies? Bear it all without grumbling, and with faith that God's help is at hand, as the apostles did."

If we do this we will have great joy because we will be following the Lord truly. AMEN.

The Protection of the Theotokos, October 1 / 14



Today our Holy Church celebrates the "Holy Protection of the Theotokos" the feast originated in the vision that St. Andrew, the Fool for Christ, had of the Theotokos covering the faithful who prayed to her. On October 1, 911 St. Andrew saw in his vision of the Theotokos hovering over the faithful protecting them with her veil (omophorion) as they prayed in the Church of the Mother of God – Blachernae in Constantinople. She was safeguarding all who prayed for her protection.

What does this mean for us today over a thousand years later? As Orthodox Christians, the communion of the saints and the power of prayer are realities that we cannot underestimate. The Mother of God stands at the throne of Our Lord ever praying and interceding for us, her children. From the cross Christ said to the Theotokos, "Woman behold your son!" and to His beloved disciple, St. John, "Behold Your Mother!' And from that hour the disciple took her to his own home" (John 19, 26-27). At the foot of Christ's cross, the Theotokos became a mother to all of us. The Apolytikion of the Feast of the Dormition of the Theotokos remind us:

In giving birth, O Theotokos, you have retained your virginity, and in falling asleep you have not forsaken the world. You who are the Mother of Life have past over into life and through your prayers you do deliver our souls from death.

"You have not forsaken the world...." This is the essence of the Theotokos', ever-present ever-watchful, ever-praying protection for us, her children. Such is the love of a Mother. Throughout the ages, she appears to holy people and people in distress to assure us of her continuing care. St Andrew is not the only one that has seen her. People who have seen her are people like you or I. She has appeared in churches, to monks on Mount Athos, in hospital rooms and in other places that she knows need her loving care. She appears to comfort and reassure her children that she is protecting us through her constant prayers. The hymns of the Church remind us that she is "more honorable than the Cherubim, and beyond compare more glorious than the Seraphim." She stands at the right hand of her Son, the model of the Church interceding always for those who in faith call upon her. As we celebrate the Feast of Her Protection let us join with the angels to sing this hymn from the Divine Liturgy According to St. Basil:

All of creation rejoices in you, O full of grace; the assembly of the angels and the human race, You are a sanctified temple and a spiritual paradise, the glory from whom God was incarnate and became a child – Our God, existing before all ages. He made your womb a throne, and your body more spacious than the heavens. All of creation rejoices in you, O full of grace.

Glory to You!



Of Boasting and Modesty

The word of the day is "boast." Our society sees achievement as a sufficient reason be proud of ourselves. It sees nothing wrong with football players who do a dance of exaltation when they score or sack the quarterback. But today in our reading of 2 Corinthians 10:7-18, Paul joins the Lord who criticized the Pharisee who congratulated himself in the "Parable of the Pharisee and Publican" (Luke 18:11).

It's Easy to Boast When One Measures Oneself

Like the Pharisee, Paul's opponents in Corinth are <u>boasting</u> of their superior powers and gifts. Moreover, they are criticizing Paul's supposed weakness and lack of talent. But Paul answers with the observation that it is easy to <u>boast</u> when one measures oneself by one's own standards. The braggart looks at himself through the mirror of his own opinion. He claims all the credit even for what others have contributed and done.

Looking Outward or Inward

But the apostle notes that those who puff themselves up in this way are "not wise" (vs. 12). The arrogant look at their outward appearance and see what they want to see. But St. Paul says that they should look inward and consider whether they are "Christ's"—and whether they are thinking and acting as if they were Christ's. Or are they just serving themselves?

Note how St. Paul demonstrates the virtue of modesty. He will not <u>boast</u> "of things beyond measure" or take credit for the accomplishments of others. He does not want to reap where others have planted. But he is resolved to take the Gospel where others have not yet preached it.
